ESTABLISHMENT OF THE APFPR HEALTH SERVICE AWARDS

Newly established registries such as the APFPR rely greatly on the engagement of early adopting clinicians to support the initial growth of the registry. In 2023, the APFPR launched provider Health Service Awards to recognise the effort and commitment of early adopting hospitals, clinicians and staff who contribute data to the APFPR. **"Hard-working clinicians are the backbone of all clinical registries. They provide the clinical leadership and frequently contribute to the data collection themselves. We know how difficult it is to find time to do this"** said APFPR Chair and health services academic Professor Susannah Ahern. **"Every time a patient is entered into the registry, the APFPR evolves from an early to a mature registry with all the opportunities that this brings."** The APFPR is approaching 1,000 registered patients and will shortly release its 2023 Annual and hospital benchmarked Reports. The **Best Contributor** Award, recognises the top contributor of patient data to the APFPR across the whole of Australia. 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Following a Senate enquiry, the APFPR was established in 2019 to systematically collect, analyse and report data on outcomes for women who are undergoing pelvic floor procedures, particularly where a medical device is implanted. The APFPR is supported by funding from the Australian Government, Department of Health and Aged Care, under the National Clinical Quality Registry Program. It currently collects clinical and Patient Reported Outcome Measures (PROMs) data and device information nationwide, which will be published in February 2024 for the first time. Contributing data into registries is voluntary in Australia.
